**PROGRAM DESCRIPTION: LAW 199-A**

"The Best of American Case Law" is a 2-week course, designed to introduce practicing lawyers and future U.S. law students to some of the most important and exciting law school cases.

Students will come to understand how the law school classroom works, experience a broad range of different areas of the law, and engage with nationally renowned law faculty. The program aims to enhance students' ability to think critically and understand case law. All students will receive a certificate for successful completion of the course.
